Caroline's Rainbow Foundation : Presentation of Laptop Computer to Mrs Marks-Stuttle by WM.

Last month the WM presented Mrs Marjorie Marks-Stuttle with a Toshiba Laptop Computer for the use of the Caroline's Rainbow Foundation. The gift was made possible as a result of the donation from Mitre Lodge of £100 which attracted a further £1000 from Province of Yorkshire (N & E Ridings).



Brethren will be aware that the Foundation was set up following the murder of Caroline Stuttle in Australia during her 'Gap Year' from College. The objectives of the Foundation is to raise the

awareness of young people regarding their well-being and safety, especially whilst travelling abroad.

Mrs Marks-Stuttle was able to update the WM and David Marsh who took the photograph on the excellent progress and developments surrounding the Foundation.

Activities include ongoing fund raising and presentations to organisations and groups at which the laptop will be invaluable. Of special interest is the laptop's opening screen. It very prominently displays the Province's coat of arms and their support of the Foundation.

Brethren will recall that Mitre Lodge sponsored this project at the request of Charity Steward Alan Keedy and is an example of how Province assists 'Non-Masonic Charities'.

FROM YOUR CHARITY STEWARD

Before joining Masonry, I was aware of its charity involvement, but even after twenty-nine years in the Craft I was unaware - until I took this position - of just what a multi-million pound and multi-dimensional operation it is. I suspect many Masons are in the same position. That is why the committee issued the A4 information sheet with last month's summons, and that is just scratching the surface.

Actually, I don't know why they gave me this job - I think they made an error. I pointed out that I had no experience of fund raising, made donations to Masonic and non-Masonic charities of my choice, objected to being badgered for contributions and, therefore, would not badger anyone else. (What have badgers done to get this reputation?) I suspect a lot of other people feel the same way. 'Just what we want,' they said. On their heads be it.

Accordingly, you may have noticed that during my eighteen months tenure (probably soon to end after

this missive!) that I have never approached an individual for contributions. I have attempted to sell programmes for Connaught Court fund raising days, and questionnaires for the current Festival, and confined myself to reporting Festival progress. In that vein then the latest figures towards the total of £2m. by May 2006 is £1,492,000

- Mitre contribution is £11,205 i.e. an average of £193 per head
- 44 of the 59 members contribute to the Festival by Direct Debit
- 20 are doing the same to Provincial Charity as well as supporting the Festival.

If anyone wishes to donate anything to any Masonic Charity, I am readily approachable and think that my Geordie accent has been modified enough to be intelligible to you Southerners. (Joke! Joke! Peace, Brethren!). Over to you.
